## Catching the Olympic Spirit!

Schools throughout Edmonton Catholic showed their Canadian pride by involving their students and staffs in all kinds of Olympics-related events and activities. Here is a good news story provided by Norma Jani, one of our Council representatives.

At St Nicholas School, we seized the Vancouver 2010 Olympic theme to get our students more active during the lunch hour. Each homeroom represented a different country and, three days a week, their team played a sport in the gymnasium. Points were awarded not only to the winning team, but for participation by teachers and students as well. Classes also had the chance to get extra points by making flags or costumes of their country. On January 13<sup>th</sup>, as the torch passed through Edmonton, the school held an opening ceremony, emceed by first-year teacher Jarrett Brophy. Norma Jani, Assistant Principal, spoke about the torch and its cross-country travels and Principal Dave Bouma declared the games open. The Olympic Games also provided an excellent opportunity for cross-curricular instruction. In Social Studies classes, students researched past games and reviewed current events. Our Religion classes have looked at justice, fairness, equality and how individuals use their God-given talents. Language Arts focused on stories of athletes and past Olympic events, while Math classes provided opportunities for students to do work centering on the results of athletes and countries. Student art projects involved the creation of Olympic posters and flags. One of the highlights of the St Nicholas Olympic experience took place on Tuesday, February 23<sup>rd</sup>, when Steve Jani, of Fort McMurray---a two-time torch bearer---brought his torch to the school and gave students the opportunity to ask questions and have their photos taken. All in all, a few exciting weeks of positive energy!

Pfeffer writes: "Layoffs literally kill people. In the United States, when you lose your job, you lose your health insurance, unless you can afford to temporarily maintain it under the pricey COBRA provisions. Studies consistently show a connection between not having health insurance and individual mortality rates."
