THE TIMES THEY ARE A-CHANGIN'

A recent book by Kegan and Lahey, <u>Immunity to Change</u>, suggests that change--- while extremely difficult---is possible. They have found in their research that 4 characteristics exist where change occurs, especially within organizations. At a recent admin meeting, I was speaking to Phebe Switzer, principal at St Timothy. I was quite taken by her story of success there and how the entire staff has embraced change so quickly and successfully. The write-up below, submitted by Phebe, at my request, is a way of us celebrating the work of our fellow teachers who exemplify these four elements:

- Respect for the importance of the other person's role in producing high-quality outcomes
- Belief in the other's ability and willingness to fulfill his or her formal role responsibilities
- Care about the other professionally and personally
- Consistency between what people say and what they do Our hats are off to you ©

At St. Timothy we have embraced 21st Century Learning! It is essential to students that we prepare them for tomorrow by engaging them in their learning. Our staff has looked at the research in learning techniques and innovations in 21st Century Learning. The principal meets with students each week at a leadership meeting and we have heard our students' voices. The students have been integral in the decision making process. We integrated their ideas and concerns with ours, as we conceived of these proposed changes together. As recent research has shown, involving students with the decision making process, giving them choices for demonstrating their learning, and having a less structured environment, enhances children's overall learning experience. We are providing an environment that is based on REGGIO, where students are comfortable and they can choose where they sit. We have couches and tables in each class and the lighting has been dimmed. We are providing choices for students in their learning, where they choose how to demonstrate their understanding. We are providing technology — netbooks, ipads, doc cameras, smart boards, cameras, scanners — for our students to use. Attendance of students has improved---they want to be at school! Discipline problems have decreased significantly! Our students are thriving! The students are led in critical and creative thinking, inquiry, problem-solving and leadership skills. 21St Century Learning is amazing and our students have chosen to write letters to their parents explaining the benefits!
